Deacon's Corner

am often asked, "How is a deacon different from a pastor?" While there are many answers to this question – enough to fill plenty of newsletters – I wanted to share a common answer that I give.

One main difference between a pastor and a deacon is found in the official name of our ministerial "office."

Our ministerial office provides the grounding for our ministry; think of it as the frame of reference for the ministry we provide. In the ELCA, deacons are known as Ministers of Word and Sacrament.

The starting place for deacons is WORD and SERVICE. In their ministry, deacons focus primarily on *proclaiming* the Word through compassionate service. Proclaiming the Word through compassionate service can be very contextual and specialized, based upon our call. Many of my colleagues do not serve in a congregation or church, but instead serve in places like non-profit organizations, hospitals, and synod offices. In my context at Triumphant, proclaiming the Word through compassionate service looks primarily like supporting our Discipleship and Servant Outreach ministries as we grow and put our faith in action.



In contrast, the starting place for pastors is WORD and SACRAMENT. In their ministry, pastors focus primarily on *preaching* the Word and administering the sacraments. This often looks like public worship in a congregational setting, where pastors preach sermons and preside over baptisms and communion.

While some of the ministry that deacons and pastors provide looks different because of our "office," it is important to remember that our roles are complimentary in the life of the church. Whether our office is Word and Sacrament, all ministers share the GOOD NEWS of God's grace to all of God's people.




Check In Questionnaire Results

In August, Church Council asked you, the congregation, for participation in a brief "Check In Questionnaire" to assess how you are attending worship services and what is your comfort level with attending in person. With 85 responses, here are the results:

1. How have you been attending worship lately?



2. What is your comfort level for attending in-person worship?



The questionnaire covered several open-ended questions as well. Participants were able to expand and elaborate on their answers. This was done so everyone who participated would be able to give answers that are as accurate and relevant as possible pertaining to their personal feelings and situation.

- 3. How has this last year impacted your relationship with church? 85 responses received
- 4. Briefly describe what and how you have learned about God in this last year? 70 responses received
- 5. Are there other comments or feedback about this last year you would like to add? 62 responses received

Loving Care Givers

hile looking for inspiration for this month's article, I rediscovered this poem, written by Owen Darnell. While it's primarily from the viewpoint of someone suffering from dementia or Alzheimer's, I think it still gives a relevant perspective.

A Poem From Care Receivers to Caregivers

Don't ask me to remember.

Don't try to make me understand.

Let me rest and know you're with me.

Kiss my cheek and hold my hand.

I'm confused beyond your concept.

I am sad and sick and lost.

All I know is that I need you

To be with me at all cost.

Do not lose patience with me.

Can't be different though I try.

Just remember that I need you.

That the best of me is gone.

Please don't fail to stand beside me.

Love me until my life is done.

Care Receivers are individuals in our congregation or community who are going through a crisis or life difficulty. They often experience high levels of stress and anxiety, which can be so overwhelming that they actually become physically and emotionally disabled. Daily experiences can be affected as well – like dreading the phone ringing because it might be more bad news or feeling trapped by daily responsibilities. Even getting a full night of restful and peaceful sleep may be rare and one may be unable to turn off the worry mode. This can lead to feeling isolated, or feeling pressured to make decisions, and not even knowing where to turn for support and practical information. Not knowing what actions to take, not feeling confident enough to decide, not knowing what specific questions to ask, or the fear of making mistakes intensify the indecision.

This is further compounded by difficulty in asking for or receiving any help. Even when you reach a point when you realize you have

a need to talk with someone about the struggles in your life, trusting someone with personal information can be intimidating. There's a roller coaster of emotions in this period of instability. It takes courage to honestly share, especially the setbacks and failures. In these dark parts of life, we need someone to point us back to the love and truth we have in Jesus Christ.

Care Receivers don't need advice, but acceptance, affirmation, and help making sense of everything happening and what they're feeling. All those insecurities, hurts, pains, and uncertainties need to be validated and processed. Someone is needed to simply walk alongside, without judgment, through the journey of pain — especially in the struggles of spiritual wounds. With all the things they've done and the messes they've been through, assurance of God's love is healing; to know God can love them THROUGH another, unconditionally.

God's love is always there, but when going through a crisis, it can be really hard to feel it – so this is when people doubt God's presence the most. Their faith is vulnerable.

Stephen Ministers are Jesus' hands and feet, and are there to care for the hurting person. In this way, they tangibly express God's love, which Care Receivers can actually feel. They get to experience God in these times of life when they can wonder if God is even there.

I encourage anyone who's suffering, discouraged, or going through a difficult time, to request a Stephen Minister. To directly and confidentially request a Stephen Minister, send me an email at rasmith0119@gmail.com. Or you may send an email to Pastor Aaron.

You'll grow and heal through their care, concern, compassion, and prayer. If someone offers YOU a Stephen Minister, say "Yes!" – it can be life changing!

The Good Steward

In the same way, let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in heaven. — Matthew 5:16 NIV

How many times have we heard the old adage "actions speak louder than words?" I know it was practically a mantra at some times in my life — one I didn't welcome all the time! In this familiar section of scripture, we are reminded of a few things:


- One, we all have a light that shines and others can see it.
- Two, others will see what we are doing whether we want them to or not!
- Three, we should be doing good deeds!
- And four, the result of our deeds should be that people praise God and not us.

Sometimes these are hard truths, but truths none the less. Light is given so that we may see, and in this seeing, we are led to the truth.

No one lights a lamp and hides it in a jar or puts it under a bed.

Instead, he puts it on a stand, so that those who come in can see the light. — Luke 8:16 NIV

I remember as a kid trying to read in bed and thinking that if I put my head under the covers, nobody would discover me. Maybe you have done the same? The very nature of light is that it can't be hidden! It only took me *years* to figure that out — heads up, folks, light wins every time! What we do with that light is entirely up to us. We can acknowledge it and use it for good (see the first passage again!) or we can ignore it and wait for it to go away. Here is another heads up — light takes its time to go away! Again, light



wins! I can't answer for all of you, but I tend to be a little impatient when waiting for things. I can guarantee you, waiting for light to disappear often takes a lot longer than I want to wait.


When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." — John 8:12 NIV

When Jesus revealed himself to the people as the light of the world, He gave us a new definition for light. Not only does it drive away darkness, it is present all the time and is there for us wherever we are. Not to mock, not to hinder, not to rob us of hope, not to punish, and most certainly not to remove us from His presence. He is here now, was here in the beginning, and is waiting for us in our future. This brings me to the ultimate thought for this month: **The light of Christ is our hope!!** The Good Steward is a vessel of hope, enough that we can keep some for ourselves and also share with those around us. Join me and let's shine the light of hope on those we meet and interact with!

August 2021 Financials

KEY POINTS:

- Bottom Line: Operating Net Income for August was -\$1,244. Operating Net Income YTD through end of August was -\$30K. We have also used \$33K of our Reserves, in part to hold our operating losses to "only" \$30K, and in part to pay for Capital expenses.
- General Offering and Income: Good news. Weekly Offering in August was \$42K or +\$9K. Weekly Offering through August YTD was \$267K, or +\$3K against budgeted, thanks to an \$11.7K annual gift. Total Income through August was \$353K, net -\$94K against budgeted, as other income sources continue to lag. This is a major reason we have been obliged to use Reserves and perhaps will be using more. Total Financial Assets are only down \$63K Net through end of August because your council is wisely underspending.
- <u>Building Fund</u>: Bldg Fund Income through **August** was \$55,874, net +\$2,730 against our required mortgage, thanks to some one-time gifts.
- Going Forward: August was a good operating month thanks to everybody's continued generosity and also some timely gifts. One concern at this point is that the \$63K net loss in financial assets YTD could have a down impact on our 2022 budget. Need a good 4th QTR.
