Pastor Aaron's Message

Dear people of God,

"For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." — Matthew 18:20

One of my favorite lessons while I was in seminary was learning Greek so we could translate the New Testament. Our teacher pointed out how often the word "you" in our English translations was actually plural, so it would more accurately be "y'all." So for example, here is 1 Corinthians 3:16 with the y'alls added: **Do y'all not know that y'all are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in y'all?** The plural changes the meaning a little bit, right? All of a sudden,

it's about how this congregation, this faith community, is a place where God can be found with God's Spirit living and moving. God is found in community.

So we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. — Romans 12:5

When we read the Bible, it is important to remember that much of it was written to communities of people. And those gatherings of people were imperfect and broken. They would struggle with pettiness, distrust, and selfishness. They would be unfaithful in their worship, practice, and



lives. And the Word of God would come to them, and guide them (sometimes in pretty serious ways!) toward reconciliation, wholeness, and life. But it wasn't just for them as individuals. It was also for the community, those who gathered and were connected to one another in their faith.

Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help. Again, if two lie together, they keep warm; but how can one keep warm alone? And though one might prevail against another, two will withstand one. A threefold cord is not quickly broken. — Ecclesiastes 4:9-12

God knows that we need one another and has created us for relationships. We live in a world where loneliness is an epidemic, where mistrust and suspicion dominate how we see each other. And so God continually tries to draw us together, healing our divisions and reconciling us together. God knows we need community to bring us life and wholeness.

Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. — Colossians 3:13

As we enter this season of Lent, our focus will be on the blessing of community that God has given us, and how Jesus' journey to the cross is a blessing for each of us and all of us. Each week, we'll grow in how Jesus connects us and brings us deeper in relationship with him and with the world around us. Because God knows that we need one another, and that it is through those around us that we grow in Christ to serve others!

TLC Member Leroy Albrecht passed away on Tuesday, January 25, at the age of 82.

Leroy was a beloved husband, brother, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, and uncle, who dedicated many years of his life to helping others and in service to his faith.

He was born on August 29, 1939, to Herbert and Telka Albrecht. Leroy graduated from Brackenridge High School in 1957. He spent 34 years working for City Public Service and retired in 1998. Precious, Healing Tears

It has been a season of deaths, funerals, hardships, and struggles – and now Ash Wednesday, Lenten season, and Good Friday are upcoming! The image of tears constantly comes up as a symbol for this season in life. Tears are part of human life that we have all experienced.

In ancient times, tears were believed to be sacred. Small vials (called lachrymatories) were used to collect tears. People collect things they find interesting, are of value, or are rare. In Psalm 56:8, David asks God to put his tears into a bottle. **This verse provides a beautiful picture of God collecting the tears of those who cry out to Him.** He's interested. You may not feel that anyone cares, but God cares. Your tears have great value, are priceless treasures which He keeps safe.

Unfortunately, often we try to keep our tears inside, to bottle them up. We are so afraid to let them flow, to grieve, to show our pain publicly and vulnerably. However, this is unhealthy, and the number of tears can be too great. But tears can cleanse the heart, mind, and spirit – washing the pain and heartache away.

God can understand our pain, anger, and heartache – His innocent Son was tragically murdered on a cross. Remember God is present, knows your pain, and promises to hold and comfort you in His everlasting arms as you cry and tremble. Your tears are sacred. When you no longer feel you can bear it, He'll help you.

In our darkest times, we can feel God is nowhere; we can feel forgotten in our pain. We wonder, "does He even see our tears?" But the God of the universe is near in our hurt, fully aware of each and every tear which falls from our eyes. Pause a moment and let that sink in — **no tear has fallen**



from your eyes that God hasn't seen. Even when we cry in secret, the Lord sees our tears and broken hearts.

David's psalm shows us that our caring God records our painful moments. He understands because Jesus felt the same burdens as we do (Heb 4:13) and promises to comfort and help us. One day He'll wipe away every tear from our eyes (Rev 21:3-5). He is aware and is setting things in motion to take care of you. We can know His presence and peace amid our difficulty. He alone can make our hearts whole again.

Stephen Ministers weep, mourn, ache, and walk alongside those who weep, mourn and ache – fulfilling what Romans 12:15 tells us to do. They are there in your anguish with a trusty box of Kleenex! They keep you focused on God, encouraging you to cling to Him in your pain, lifting your eyes to Him instead of cursing Him. They help sow seeds of Biblical truth, hope, and grace into your soul.

Our weeping may seem endless, but we all need to remember that with God and a Stephen Minister, the journey through the dark valley will be successful with joy returning on the other side (Psalm 30:5).

Throughout the Bible, and throughout generations, men and women alike have had their tears recorded – even Jesus wept. No one wants to suffer, but suffering together builds Christian bonds and unity.

Washington Irving said this about tears: "There is sacredness in tears. They are not the mark of weakness, but of power. They speak more eloquently than ten thousand tongues. They are messengers of overwhelming grief, of deep contrition, and of unspeakable love."

From Our Missionary in Jamaica

Dear Friends and Supporters, Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I want to share with you a wonderful experience that I had visiting the Holy Trinity Ethiopian Orthodox

Tewahedo Church (eotcja.org) here in Kingston, Jamaica. The importance of Ethiopian Christianity for

Jamaicans was made very clear to me last semester when I was teaching a course on the early church. One

thing I have noticed in teaching church history for many years is that students will latch onto material that they find highly relevant for their own understanding, and my students last semester latched onto the history of the Ethiopian Orthodox Church.

This church started in the early fourth century when two Christian Syrian boys were captured from a boat on the Red Sea and sold to the king of Ethiopia, in whose court they grew up along with the prince, Ezana. They were freed as adults and one of them, Frumentius, went to Egypt to request that the bishop of Alexandria, Athanasius, send a missionary bishop to Ethiopia; Athanasius sent Frumentius himself in 347. The church grew from the royal household out, and around 480 a group of nine Syrian monks arrived to establish a thriving network of

monasteries throughout Ethiopia. The kings of Ethiopia became powerful and connected their dynasties with that of King Solomon from the Bible. The thirteenth-century King Lalibela built a series of enormous rock-hewn churches at Roha, representing pilgrimage sites in Jerusalem, thus making Ethiopia itself a "holy land." For many Jamaicans emerging from slavery in the late nineteenth century, this African hold land became a powerful symbol of a free and royal past that would inspire the rise of Rastafarianism in the twentieth century. It was the Rastafarians who asked Emperor Haile Selassie I to authorize the establishment of the Ethiopian Orthodox Church in Jamaica, and he did so in 1970, after which the most famous Rastafarian, the

reggae singer Bob Marley, converted to Christianity and was buried as a member of the Ethiopian Orthodox Church in 1981. The influence of this church extends to other Christian churches as well. For example, the fact that many rural Ethiopian churches are round inspired Mona Baptist Church, just down the street from the United Theological College of the West Indies, where I teach, to build a round church building for themselves in the Ethiopian style. The day that I visited

the Ethiopian Orthodox Church was really special because the (5-hour-long!) liturgy opened with the baptism of a baby girl named Garnette Mariam; her second name comes from Mary, Jesus'

mother, depicted on an icon at the church. A drum was played by one of the women during the worship service to accompany the hymns, which were otherwise chanted acapella. Among the

scriptural texts that were read during the baptism was Acts 8:26-40, which is about an Ethiopian eunuch who is baptized by the apostle Philip. Just before the baptism, the whole congregation was asked to renounce the devil and all his works four times, once facing toward the east, once toward the west, once toward the north, and once toward the south. Then Garnette Mariam was lowered three times in the name of the Triune God into a large basin of water, after which the priest anointed her with oil on almost every part of her body as a seal of the Holy Spirit that cannot be broken. Then, rather than clapping in celebration, the congregation ululated joyfully. As we say in the Lutheran Church, Garnette Mariam, "We welcome you into the body of Christ and into the mission we share: join us in giving thanks and praise to God and bearing God's creative and redeeming word to all the world."

7 Important Women of the Protestant Reformation

While October 31 is generally celebrated in the United States as Halloween, the date is also significant because it's the anniversary of when the Protestant Reformation began.

Famous figures of the religious movement include the Augustinian monk Martin Luther, lawyer and theologian John Calvin, and the Presbyterian missionary John Knox.

The Reformation wasn't only a movement comprised of men, however, as several prominent women played their part in advancing Protestant beliefs and supporting the movement.

Seven notable women of the Protestant Reformation are revealed in the following list. They include apologetic writers, queens, a runaway German nun, and a prominent English martyr.

Marie Dentière, c. 1495 - 1561

Born in 1495 to a noble family in France, Marie Dentière originally served as a prioress at an Augustinian convent before learning about the Reformation led her to leave the cloistered life.

Dentière focused on converting nuns to the Reformation cause, and wrote apologetic works in defense of Reformed theology, and even earned the respect of John Calvin, who at one point asked her to write the foreword for one of his printed sermons.



"In 2002, Marie Dentière became the only woman to have her name engraved on the famous Wall of Reformers in Geneva," wrote Adrien Segal of Desiring God.

"There is no question she lacked what those of the time considered appropriate feminine modesty and humility, but because her passion was kindled by the pages of Scripture, her writing stirred and changed hearts not only in her own day, but in ours today, as well."

Treasurer's Corner

APPY NEW YEAR! Yes, you'll be reading this in March, but my report covers the first month of 2022 so it's almost like "Happy New Year" all over again! Just like a hibernating bear slowly awakens from his winter slumber and begins to move about, January 2022 was a slow start for Triumphant. As we begin our new 2022 Budget, our monthly goal for General Operating funds was raised to a monthly goal of \$41,746, up slightly from our 2021 monthly goal of \$33,070. We started off the year with General Operating offering at \$30,722. Fortunately, the Preschool had an overall net profit of \$6,048 and we had a one-time gift of \$5,000, both of which helped us recover the slow start to the year.

Our Building Fund also had a slow start for 2022, with Building Fund donations totaling only \$5,807. The remaining balance to meet our monthly mortgage payment of \$7,592 was taken from our Building Fund reserve account. Also, as I mentioned last month, Council approved using the 2021 Excess Building Fund reserve for our mortgage principal. You'll notice a nice up-tick in the green bar on the Financial Graph! We only have \$554,719 left on our Mortgage!

A **FUN FACT** about Giving:

Did you know there are many different ways to donate to the General Operations, Building Fund, and many specific designated activities at Triumphant? These include the traditional methods of cash and check, but also modern methods of E-giving, donations through our Website, stock options, required IRA distributions, electronic bank checks, and many more! Check out the Triumphant Website's Giving Page for more information.

I want to invite you to be part of our Finance Team, which meets monthly (currently by ZOOM) on the first Monday of each month. The team reviews the previous month's financial status and makes recommendations to Council for monetary adjustments and planning. If you're interested, send me an email and I'll ensure you get a ZOOM invite.

RMDs and QCDs

What do you know about RMDs and QCDs?

At a recent Finance team meeting, several of us were talking about RMDs and QCDs. One of our younger members on the team asked, "What are you guys

talking about? What are RMDs and QCDs?"

An RMD is a Required
Minimum Distribution. The
Federal laws require anyone
who is 72 years old with an
IRA (Individual Retirement
Account) to withdraw funds
from their IRA each year.



A QCD is a Qualified Charitable Distribution. The Federal law allows the RMD to be considered a nontaxable QCD if the distribution goes to an organization eligible to receive tax deductible contributions. The QCD is generally a nontaxable distribution made directly by the trustee of your IRA to the qualified organization.

Triumphant Lutheran is a qualified charitable organization. We have several members who are using these provisions of law to donate their RMDs to the church. As other members reach the age to take an RMD, we hope more will consider the QCD option.

We found information on this subject in IRS
Publication 590 which can be found on the IRS
website: irs.gov. We would advise anyone considering
this option to contact their financial advisor to ensure
the requirements of Publication 590 are followed to
allow a nontaxable distribution. Questions can be


January 2022 Financials

KEY POINTS:

January was a slow start to the year in both General Operating and Building Fund accounts. Fortunately, the Preschool had a profit of \$6,048.91 which bolstered our month-end amounts. We also had a one-time General Operating Fund donation of \$5,000.00.

Building Fund and Mortgage: The Building Fund in January also had a slow start for the year, receiving only \$5,807.23 which included a one-time gift of \$1,200.00. The remaining \$1,784.77 needed to make the monthly mortgage payment was taken from the Building Fund Current Excess account. We also applied the 2021 Year-End Excess Building Fund reserve to the mortgage, making a \$27,345.60 payment to the principal.

Mortgage: Council approved the Finance Team to proceed with refinancing our mortgage to take advantage of low interest rates which essentially will allow us to keep the same mortgage payment but reduce the payoff time to 2028.
