Greetings, people of God!

With Deacon Chris on sabbatical, studying more about the role of deacons in the church's history, I thought it would be helpful to do a little studying of my own, starting with a look through the Bible at the crucial and often overlooked role of deacons in the early church.

Deacons first came on the scene as the church was in its infancy. In the Pentecost story, the Holy Spirit filled the disciples, and they began to speak in other languages. Peter proclaimed the good news about Jesus, and, as a result, thousands of people joined the group to worship, live, and serve together (Acts 2:43-47). People came from all around the area, bringing those who were ill and those tormented by demons, and the disciples were able to cure them. But a challenge soon arose: the disciples were having difficulty caring for those in need and continuing to proclaim the good news, especially while they experienced increased persecution.

And so seven people from the community were chosen to take on caring for those who were in need: Stephen, Philip, Prochorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicolaus. Only two of these are mentioned further in the New Testament, Stephen and Philip. Stephen is considered the first martyr of the church; quickly following his selection as deacon, he was brought up on charges of blasphemy. After speaking passionately about the history of Israel and God's coming in Jesus Christ, a group threw stones at him until he died. His last words imitate the forgiveness of Jesus: "Lord, do not hold this sin against them."

After Stephen's death, the early church scattered for safety. Philip began to proclaim the good news, first converting the town of Samaria and then meeting the Ethiopian eunuch on the road (Acts 8). His spiritual gift of evangelism allowed him to meet people along the way, and it is something he shared with his four daughters, who welcomed Paul late in his journey (Acts 21).

Deacons and their qualifications are mentioned several times throughout the New Testament, and they played a central role in the life and witness of the early church. Deacons "must be serious, not double-tongued, not indulging in much wine, not greedy for money; they must hold fast to the mystery of the faith with a clear conscience" (1 Timothy 3). Deacons were not limited by gender, and we hear in Romans 16 how Phoebe, a deacon of the church at Cenchrae (in Greece), should be welcomed when she arrived in Rome.

From the very beginning, the work of deacons mirrored Jesus's work. In Mark 10:45, Jesus says: "For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many." The word 'serve' is the root word in 'deacon,' emphasizing the calling that Jesus fulfills: to serve, minister, help, and take care of those who are in need. Deacons have guided the Church throughout its life in this mission, even in our own congregation: "We grow in Christ to **SERVE** others."

May God's serving and caring heart call you to love others today!



# **The Good Steward**

Whether you turn to the right or to the left, your ears will hear a voice behind you saying, "This is the way; walk in it." - Isaiah 30:21 NIV

*T*f you are anything like me, certain voices resonate throughout your Ifetime. I hear their words and am often convicted by them. My mother - wow, could she convict me! Her favorite saying was something along the lines of "do the right thing even if it isn't fun, or your first choice, or your second choice." Her overall statement was to do what was best for all concerned. I may have mentioned this to you before, but I am reminded every day how right she was. Her voice still guides me in the decisions that I make. I have to be reminded that I am not the only one here.

My dear brothers, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, for anger does not bring about the righteous life that God desires. — James 1:19 – 20 NIV

Have you ever had a conversation with someone who really didn't listen to what you were saying? It may have seemed as if their own voice was the only one they needed to hear, and so, by extension, the only one you needed to

hear. I admit to being like that sometimes. I have something to say and you are GOING to hear me! But is that really the best way to learn about your neighbor, family members, or brothers and sisters in Christ?

Life during the pandemic has been hard! We have not used some of our communication skills as often and it shows. We don't exhibit the kind of patience necessary to really hear and heed what others are saying. What happens next? We get antsy ... you know ... like you want to say "Just get to the point!" Hurt feelings and anger can develop. Then we are no longer communicating — we are just making noise. Is this really the kind of noise God wants to hear from us?

#### Then a cloud appeared and enveloped them, and a voice came from the cloud: "This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!" — Mark 9:7 NIV


The Good Steward is only human, and can fall into the trap of listening only to respond instead of to actually understand what is being said. The Good Steward is also a forgiven child of God. We have a chance to listen to Jesus. We have a chance to understand His message about loving our neighbors and, in some cases, to better understand our neighbor. We hear Jesus in the words of scripture, in the words of our friends, family members, and neighbors. We may hear Jesus in the groans from those who are frustrated and tired. We may hear Jesus in the laughter and joy of those around us. We may hear Jesus in the way we treat others and the way they treat us. Hmmm, then we think about what just happened. I invite you to join me as I continue to learn about slowing down and really listening to the world around me — this Good Steward needs to learn that lesson again every day. I pray that you hear Jesus today and every day, with a heart ready to really listen to Him. Amen. 



# **April 2021 Financials**

#### KEY POINTS:

- Bottom Line: Total Net Income for April was -\$869. Total Net Income YTD is -\$23,209. See the Financial Summary at the bottom of the page for more detail.
- General Offering: Weekly Offering through April was \$123,816, net -\$8,463 against programmed. ECP's Preschool program has resumed and is helping, but this will likely be a slow rebuild, most of the year. Also, the big freeze damaged the ECP facilities quite a bit.
- Building Fund: Bldg Fund Income through April was \$31,530, net +\$1,162 against our required mortgage, thanks to some one-time gifts.
- Going Forward: We have strong reserves. That said, last year ended well because we received PPP loan benefits of \$87,600. We do not qualify for the Round 2 PPP in 2021. The ECP will be rebuilding in 2021, but it will take the whole year if not longer. Bottom line, there will likely be a need to support normal operations with \$50-80K from Reserves in 2021, barring additional revenue from other than PPP. We are exploring one other potential source now. It will not be as large as the 2020 PPP (possibly 1/3<sup>rd</sup>), but will of course be helpful. Big Freeze repair costs also remain in front of us. Insurance will offset somewhat.
