



Pastor Aaron's Message



Dear people of God,

When we think about this season, we find at its center the One who has come to be Emmanuel, which means 'God with us.' And this isn't just Emmanuel when things are happy and joyful, but in the midst of our sadness and despair. Jesus meets us wherever we are. Jesus saw crowds of hopeless and broken people, and had compassion. Jesus stood with the mourners at the tomb of Lazarus, and began to weep even though he was going to raise Lazarus from the dead. Over and over, Jesus finds people hurting and struggling, and meets them where they are. This is the very real blessing of having a savior who is born to be Emmanuel, God with us. To have a God who is one with us.

And so, wherever and however you find yourself in this holiday season, my hope and prayer is that you know that God has promised to go alongside you and is with you. His love, empathy, and compassion stays with us through it all.

Christmas in the Trenches

Merry Christmas Members of TLC!

I want to thank everyone who participated and assisted with our Annual Congregational Meeting last month. I want to especially thank my fellow Council members who served this past year under continued trying circumstances. It is a blessing to work with so many talented individuals who work towards making TLC a place of fun, hope, and learning as we minister God's Word to our community. I especially want to thank Jim Moreland, Jessica Anderson, and Doug Hammerstrom whose terms are ending after two years on Council. Thank you for the work you did and your leadership on behalf of our church family!

I also want to thank our new Council Members for stepping into their important roles: Kim Hinze, Charles Beierle, Gordon Hengst, and John Shultz. I am looking forward to another great year leading a Council that will be focusing on ways to strengthen the positive message stated at the annual meeting.

The Christmas season always brings a sense of hope each year, no matter what is going on in our crazy world. It is a time for renewal and remembrance all at once as we gather to celebrate the birth of Christ. Throughout history, we can see the impact of that hope in many examples. One in particular that always astounds me is the famous Christmas Truce in 1914 during WWI. Starting on Christmas Eve, many German and British troops fighting in World War I sang Christmas carols to each other across the lines, and at certain points, the Allied soldiers even heard brass bands joining the Germans in their singing. At the first light of dawn on Christmas Day, some German soldiers emerged from their trenches and approached the Allied lines across no-man's-land, calling out "Merry Christmas" in their enemies' native tongues. At first, the Allied soldiers feared it was a trick, but seeing the

Germans unarmed they climbed out of their trenches and shook hands with the enemy soldiers. The men exchanged presents of cigarettes and plum puddings and sang carols and songs. Some

Germans lit Christmas trees around their trenches, and there was even a documented case of soldiers from opposing sides playing a game of soccer. The so-called Christmas Truce of 1914 came only five months after the outbreak of war in Europe, and was one

of the last examples of the outdated notion of chivalry between enemies in warfare. It was never repeated — future attempts at holiday ceasefires were quashed by officers' threats of disciplinary action — but it served as heartening proof, however brief, that beneath the brutal clash of weapons, the soldiers' essential humanity endured.

During World War I, the soldiers on the Western Front did not expect to celebrate on the battlefield, but even a world war could not destroy the Christmas spirit.

This story reminds me that no matter what challenges we face, the miracle that God brought to us cannot be destroyed, and the message of Christ lives in even the most dire of circumstances.

So with the hope of a New Year, I wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!

obody should seek his own good, but the good of others. — 1 Corinthians 10:24 NIV

My Mom was really smart! I have come to realize this more and more over the years. She didn't really tell me not to do something so much as to think things through. There were times I would have preferred the "don't do" over the "think about it." This meant that I had to think of others and how my actions would affect them before I doing what I wanted to do. Emmanuel — "God With Us"

uring a recent Stephen Ministry continuing education meeting, we were exploring the numerous attributes of God. Emmanuel (God with us) is one that especially resonates during this season. It implies an awareness of God – in nature via rainbows, celestial bodies, mountains, rivers, the seasons, or even in a newborn baby's cry at birth. We see Him in compassionate, generous, and selfless acts. His presence is everywhere and in everyday life.

Throughout centuries, Emmanuel has been written in Christmas cards and sung in beloved hymns. It is in Matthew 1:23, "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call Him Emmanuel, which means 'God with us'," that the Old Testament hope-filled prophecy came true in Jesus. When Christ came to earth, He literally became "God with us." Christ's birth was God ordained and accomplished. He is more than a friend who walks beside us; He lives inside us believers, giving us strength in weakness, courage in fear, and life in places that once felt dead. He meets us where we are.

Christmas isn't always a joyous occasion for everyone. Some may be dealing with the grief of the death of a loved one, loss of a job, declining health, or other crisis. There is loneliness, pain, and heartache. To them, God may seem distant, uncaring, unresponsive, or even unaware. Psalm 139:7 says, "Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence?" and makes it clear that God is everywhere. There is nowhere we can go that God is not already there. As you meditate on this truth, hope should arise in your heart. God is with YOU in every situation, whether good or bad. God is with us! God came to dwell among us and within us forever.

The truth of Christmas is that God put on human flesh and became one of us. His very name, as He lay as a baby in a manger, was — and remains — the message: God With Us. Emmanuel became one of us and suffered as we suffer so He could fully understand our pain — how to comfort and help us. He came to set us right with God. No matter the crisis, we're not alone because Emmanuel is present. He is with you this very moment. He meets your needs — strength, deliverance, hope, and discernment. While you may feel alone, and it may appear that you're alone, Christ is there with you. He sees you. He understands your heart. He can and will help you. You have His love, strength, security, provision, and care. Simply rest, knowing He is with you, in you, loves you, and will never leave you.

This Christmas, enjoy fully the gift of Emmanuel. How will you respond afresh to the Christ child this Christmas?

I close with this poem by Mandi Wilding:

God's Promise


God has not promised

October 2021 Financials

KEY POINTS:

- ⊕ Bottom Line: Operating Net Income for Oct was -\$175. Operating Net Income YTD through the end of Oct was -\$15K, actually a great improvement. We have used \$35K of our Reserves --- some for Operating Expenses and some for Capital Expenses.
- General Offering and Income: See the next two charts below. Weekly Offering is ahead for the year, thanks to members continued growth in Weekly Offering and greater than usual gifts so far this year. Total Income through Oct was \$475K, net -\$96K against budgeted, as other income sources continue to somewhat lag (but are improving). Total Financial Assets are only down -\$64K Net through the end of Oct because the council is wisely underspending.
- Building Fund: Bldg Fund Income through Oct was \$76,957, net +\$1,037, against our required mortgage. Bldg Fund made it through summer holding its own, and Reserve is good.
- Going Forward: Through end Oct the generosity of our members' Weekly Offering and Gifts has been really good!! Although 2022 will still be a bit of a rebuilding year, we have high hopes that with everybody's continued generosity and our other programs getting caught up, we can be operating on all cylinders by the end of 2022.
