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Pastor Aaron's Message

Pray without ceasing — 1 Thessalonians 5:17 NRSV

Dear people of God,

I find that there are passages of Scripture that make me think, "Whew. I don't know. That's hard."

For example: "If anyone strikes you on the right cheek, turn the other also (Matthew 5:44)." Hmm. That would not be my first instinct, God.

Or here's another: "Sell all that you own and distribute the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me (Luke 18:22)." Um, God. I don't know...

Or there's the one at the top: "Pray without ceasing." Even when sleeping, God? Or when the TV is on? How about when I'm playing with my phone?

Sometimes, the problem is in translation, but in the case of "pray without ceasing," the Greek phrase truly means — pray without ever stopping, or without interruption. That doesn't help.

So, I guess we have to deal with it. My usual definition of prayer is conversation (and therefore connection) with God, which involves speaking, listening, and being present and connected to God. To pray without ceasing means that as we go throughout our day, we are also keeping our connection to God. As we spend time with loved ones, work or go to school, shop, drive (and therefore get stuck in traffic), praying without ceasing means that we notice and share with our God everything that we do. When we hear about struggles from others, whether those we love or those around the world, we can lift them up to God and ask for healing. As we work or learn, we can give thanks for those who are helping us, or thank God for the gifts and skills He has given us. Or when we are driving, we can pray for those around us, or at least for patience as we sit in traffic. It means that our attention should always be pulled back to our constant connection to God, being aware of the presence of God that goes with us everywhere.

Praying without ceasing means that we will probably pray for a variety of different things, as we notice and give thanks for those around us. On a car trip recently, one of my kids gave thanks for cows and the dairy products that they provide. Cows are not a part of my normal prayer routine, and yet they play an important part of our lives. In our efforts for constant prayer, God may help us by revealing the breadth and depth of all that is around us.

As part of our worship this summer, we will concentrate on expanding our prayer focus. We'll have some usual prayers such as praying for the sick, celebrating birthdays and anniversaries, and for those who have died. Additionally, we will cycle through including prayers for ministries of caring, creation, farming, and more. It gives us a chance for a fuller and broader prayer life as a congregation, and helps us to recognize more that we can pray for.

"Pray without ceasing" can feel overwhelming, but gives us a chance to be in constant connection with the God whose love goes with us, whose presence is all around us, and whose giving is shown throughout our days.

May God's peace be with you!

The school year has wrapped up and Preschool graduation was held on May 25. We thank our teachers and staff for their dedication and love throughout another school year. Three different Preschool Camps will be held this summer: "Top Chef" on June 6 - 10; "Science Camp" on July 11 - 15; "Ocean Camp" on August 15 - 19.

During the morning services on Sunday, June 5, please join us in saying thank you to Preschool Director Kristin Miller. Kristin is retiring after many years of passionate and committed service to the Preschool. She taught Pre-K and 3-year-old classes before



becoming the director in 2006. We thank Kristin for her years of service and ask God to bless her in her new adventures that await.

The ECP has received funding from the Texas Workforce Commission's Child Care Relief Fund (CCRF). The CCRF was created from the American Rescue Plan Act for direct relief to childcare programs, and is a one-time opportunity available for expenses necessary to maintain or resume operations after the interruption of the program due to Covid-19. The funds must be used within very specific guidelines. Marilyn Winters brought the application to the ECP and Kristin Miller applied. With their efforts, TLC's ECP has been granted \$217, 000. ECP will be using funding for the following: staff salary and retention, playground refurbishment, security cameras and installation, preschool technology, and student scholarships. We are excited by the monetary blessing that will help us continue to provide quality, Christian education for preschoolers.

The Good Shepherd

Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also the interests of others. — Philippians 2:4 NIV

he more I reflect on the wisdom of my mother, the more I am convinced that she was indeed brilliant! She didn't really tell me NOT to do something when I would leave the house, she told me TO DO something. Her parting words to me were always, "Do what is best for everyone concerned," and that she loved me. I think that is what Paul is telling the church in Philippi in this passage. Focus on the greater good for all people rather than a temporary singular action limited only to yourself.

You, however, are controlled not by the sinful nature but by the Spirit, if the Spirit of God lives in you.

- Romans 8:9 NIV

"Different" — that is the word that comes to mind when I consider these two passages together. We are different from the rest of the world. As members of the body of Christ, we are called to think more about the others in our surroundings than about our individual circumstances and places. When we live by the power of God's Spirit in us, we see things from lots of points of view. We are forced to see so many ways of interpreting the world around us. This is a good thing!! How many times have you encountered a person, place, or thing — then reacted to that stimulus — and then wished you had taken a moment, or several moments, to think the situation through completely. It happens to me more than I would like to admit.

I pray also that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, and his incomparably great power for us who believe. — Ephesians 1:18 – 19a NIV

Porn after the beginning of the Protestant Reformation, Queen Elizabeth I came to power after the death of Queen Mary, infamously labeled "Bloody Mary" for her persecution of Protestants.

Queen Elizabeth I is credited with making Protestant Christianity the official religion of England, while also allowing for a general toleration of other Christian denominations.

"It is notable that, although she herself had been imprisoned in the Tower of London and threatened with execution, she ended the religious persecutions without allowing retribution or revenge," explained The Reformation Society.

"She steadfastly resisted all attempts to punish Catholics, insisting that, unless they broke the laws of the realm, they were entitled to equal protection under the law."

The "Kintsugi" of God

ecently, I've been reflecting on the concept of brokenness. This is not an unfamiliar topic. It's easy to realize that we live in a broken world, filled with broken people. No one makes it through life avoiding it. We all know about broken friendships, marriages, and relationships; about broken hearts, grief from the loss of loved ones, complicated external situations, and internal struggles that break our will and wear us down. There are so many ways to be broken and they occur throughout our lives. Some of these are so intense you just don't know if things can ever be restored.

In this world, broken things are despised, considered worthless, rejected, thrown away, and replaced – even damaged people. When relationships break down, often we walk away and don't work at reconciliation. Unfortunately, the world is full of people with broken hearts, spirits, and relationships. Although there are things in our lives which need to be broken – like pride, self-will, sinful habits – there's something about our reaching a breaking point which causes us to seek God more sincerely. Psalm 34:18 says, "The Lord is close to the broken hearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit."

In a past article, I referred to the ancient Japanese art of ceramic repair called "kintsugi." Indulge me in a bit of a refresher and perhaps a deeper explanation. Kintsugi means "to patch with gold." Broken pieces of pottery are repaired by sealing cracks and even small holes with a lacquer made with gold or silver. The basic philosophy is to embrace the imperfect, the broken, while recognizing the history of the piece. A secondary goal is to visually enhance and highlight the repair instead of simply hiding its flaws. The ultimate goal is to make the object more beautiful, useful, and valuable than the original and to cherish it once again. The



restoration process gives the piece a new story. Our regular repairs of broken things, nicely sealed with super glue, hide the flaws and aim to make fixed items look "good as new," while kintsugi repair aims to make them "better than new." The uniqueness of the added gold or silver becomes a piece of the item's new unique beauty and history.

Some of our life experiences can be so deep and intense that we feel beyond shattered and destroyed, but ground into fine dust – so broken-hearted that we are without hope. Just like kintsugi, God can repair the brokenness in our lives and make us more beautiful in the process. Instead of giving in to our tendency to give up, we need to embrace our flaws, seek God, and surrender to Him. In His grace, mercy, and love He makes us whole. The scars of our brokenness, like the cracks in the broken pottery, tell our story. They are evidence of where we've been and what God has done in our lives.

These scars of life, our healed wounds, shouldn't be hidden, but presented to the world. Rather than a safe façade, we should find the strength to share our more perfect beautiful self as we risk showing our vulnerable self. Remember, we have a Great Physician/Healer who repairs our broken pieces into a perfect design. He alone can transform us from the inside out as he mends us, creating a better work of art than we ever dreamed was possible. He makes all things beautiful, especially the broken, all from His grace, love, and mercy. He gives this real life — jagged edges and all — value, worth, and meaning.

Treasurer's Corner

his Treasurer's report covers the month of April which included our Easter Celebration!
As I mentioned in my March report, our first quarter was running behind our Budget Year-to-Date amount, but the Finance Team was hopeful because April included Easter and May was a 5-Sunday month



along with Mother's Day. As the graphs show on the page 14, we made our monthly goal for the General Operating Fund, but didn't make our monthly goal for Building Fund donations. So overall, we are still behind in our Offering Year-to-Date goal and additional funds were taken out of our Building Fund Excess account to make up the difference for our mortgage payment. The Building Fund Excess account is currently running a deficit of \$6,322.18. The Finance Team will review the overall status at the end of the 2nd quarter and make a recommendation to Council on what additional actions to take with the Building Fund Excess account, our 3-month Building Fund Reserves, and our Leadership reserve accounts. I encourage everyone to use automatic bill pay or some other form of auto-pay. This will help to stabilize our income over the summer as families take vacations and may not be able to get their offering and building fund donations to the church in person during their absence.

The Finance Team recommended and the Council approved, keeping our mortgage payment at the original amount of \$7,592.00 for the remainder of the year, even though the refinancing has lowered our payment by \$300. By keeping the original amount, and if we keep the original amount through 2025, we can reduce our mortgage term by several months! I'm confident that Triumphant will step up to the challenge and keep our Building Fund healthy. It currently needs some special attention as we move into the summer months.

he Confirmation class embarked on a field trip during one of the Wednesday Nite Live classes last month to Covenant Baptist Church in Garden Ridge. Ministry in Jamaica

Dear friends and companions in ministry,

"Let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are now being raised up, and things which had grown old are being made new, and that all things are being brought to perfection by Him through whom all things were made, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord"

— The Church in the Province of the West Indies, The Book of Common Prayer, reprint edition, 2007, pg 242



The good news above was part of a worship service that I attended on Good Friday at the chapel of the University of the West Indies (UWI), where I often worship with the Anglican community. In the photo to the left, you can see that the chapel's arched entrance echoes the arches in the background, which are the remains of an aqueduct that supplied water to the sugarcane plantation that used to be where the university is now.

In a sense, it was sugar that made the Caribbean. This past semester, I have been co-teaching a course on Caribbean Church History with a veteran teacher of the subject, colleague Rev. Dr.

Glenroy Lalor, from whom I have learned a lot. On day one of the course, we tried to define "the Caribbean," and by process of elimination, we decided on this definition: The Caribbean is the ethnically diverse coasts and islands of the western Atlantic Ocean that share a history of sugar plantations worked by enslaved Africans.

Most Jamaicans today are descendants of the Africans who were captured, enslaved, transported, and made to work on the sugar plantations until they died. It is an extremely painful legacy and the trauma of it has not yet healed. It was Roger Copeland, one of the students at the United Theological College of the West Indies (UTCWI) where I teach, who once shared with me the plantation history of the university when he joined me in worship at the UWI chapel. Then he said something unforgettable. He turned to me and said, "It's good that they put this chapel here so that what happens in it can begin to heal the wounds of the past; there is still so much pain." That chapel, where we celebrate the life of Jesus, his healing ministry, his teaching about the reign of God, his suffering and death, his resurrection, and his sharing with us of his body, blood and Spirit, is placed directly on the wound of the past, in the middle of the place of slavery. What a witness to the God who is with us to give us life where and when we need it most!

This Easter message is what students at UTCWI are being trained to share with the communities they will serve so that, through them, God can heal the people and raise the downcast. Those who are in Christ have a new life that is not defined only by the pain of the past but also by the freedom of the present and the perfection of the future. Caribbeans who are in Christ embrace a definition of themselves that includes what is good, beautiful, creative, and joyful as Christ heals them, his own people whom he has made and rescued.

Ministry in Jamaica, continued

One fun example of this celebration of life in the Caribbean took place on campus in February — "Reggae month" in Jamaica. The staff of the Registrar's office hosted a "Crazy Hat Day" and invited everyone to wear a hat with a Jamaican theme. My favorite was the hat made by Kimberley Walker, the registry assistant. She models it in the photo, and she gave me this explanation of its features:



"On my hat made of thatch are:


- Jamaica's national fruit, Ackee (The pulp inside is usually eaten for breakfast, fried with thyme, scallions, and saltfish.)
- Jamaica's Coat of Arms
- Jamaica's National Flower (Lignum Vitae)
- Jamaican flag
- a fern (at the back, not visible in the picture)

It is a priceless gift to be able to share new life in Christ with the community at UTCWI and with you.


April 2022 Financials

KEY POINTS:

April: April was much better than March, but lower than what the Finance Team had hoped for the month, since Easter was in April. Offering total for the month was slightly higher than our monthly budget, which was a nice little boost, but our Offering Year-to-Date is still running about \$15,000 behind our YTD Budget as shown in the bar graph below.

Building Fund and Mortgage: The Building Fund did not receive enough in April to meet the monthly mortgage, so \$2,077.77 was taken from the Building Fund Current Excess Account to make the full mortgage payment. The Building Fund Excess Reserve now has a deficit balance of \$-6,322.18

₩ Mortgage: Our current Mortgage balance is \$538,176.29 and continues to decrease with every month.
