Pastor Aaron's Message

Dear people of God,

Last month, I wrote about the oft-repeated theme of community throughout Scripture, and God's presence within those relationships and connections. And this month, we have another glimpse of community as our eyes turn toward the end of the Lenten season and the cross that is there.

As we near the end of the Passion story of Jesus Christ's betrayal, arrest, trial, and crucifixion, we find ourselves gathered in another community at the foot of the cross. In John's Gospel, it is where we find Jesus' mother and other women, who came to be with him in his suffering. There we join them, a multitude assembled at the our Savior's feet.

Colossians 1:19-20 tells us (the bold words are my emphasis): *For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to **reconcile to himself all things**, whether on earth or in heaven, by **making peace through the blood of his cross**.*

In this passage, we find God's desire: to reconcile and connect all things to God. Through Jesus' death on the cross, all people and creation are united into a new community, now made peaceful through Jesus' generous sacrifice.

The beautiful hymn "Were You There" is often sung on Good Friday:

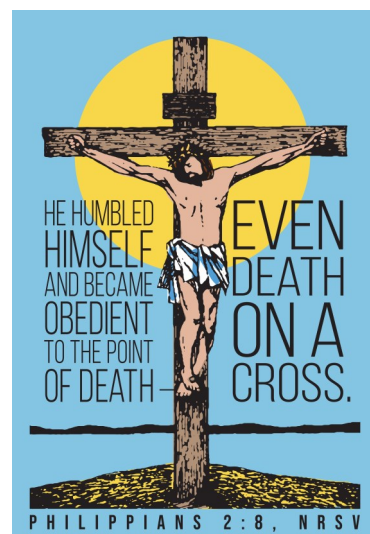
**Were you there when they crucified my Lord?
Were you there when they crucified my Lord?
Oh, sometimes it causes me to tremble, tremble, tremble.
Were you there when they crucified my Lord?**

We are all there. We all stand there at Jesus' crucifixion. We are witnesses to the lengths that God will go. We are recipients of the grace God gives to us there. We stand at the cross, beholding our God who accepts death on our behalf so that we might know life. We all are here, saints and sinners, heroes and villains, friends and enemies. Here God gathers us, staring up at the God who came down to earth, who became human with us, who blessed and gave hope, and who now dies for us.

With the promise of new life, of the hope of the resurrection, we gather as the community of God, reconciled and embraced by the death of this One on the cross. Here we become God's people. And that promise will never be broken.

May God's love and life embrace you through this Lenten season!

Dr. Debbie Cottrell is a native of Dallas, Texas. Prior to assuming the presidency of Texas Lutheran University in 2019, she served as Vice President for Academic Affairs at TLU for seven years. As president, she has led TLU in creating a new strategic plan that focuses on strengthening the student experience; diversifying academic programs; furthering a culture of diversity, equity, and inclusion; enhancing financial stability; and creating strong community partnerships. In the presidency, Dr. Cottrell has drawn on her work as chief academic officer, particularly in the areas of facilities expansion and growth in sponsored research opportunities.

Dr. Cottrell holds a bachelor's degree from Baylor University and a master's and Ph.D. in History from the University of Texas at Austin. Prior to attending graduate school, Dr. Cottrell taught middle school and worked as an editor at the Texas Historical Commission in Austin. Following completion of her Ph.D., she began her college teaching career at Cottey College in Missouri. She subsequently held administrative positions at Smith College in Massachusetts and William Peace University in North Carolina. Her scholarly interests are in the area of U.S. women's history and the history of education, along with a distinct appreciation for regional history.

Dr. Cottrell serves on the Board of the Independent Colleges and Universities of Texas (ICUT) and is active in numerous programs of the Network of ELCA Colleges and Universities (NECU) and the Council of Independent Colleges.

Dr. Cottrell is married to a fellow historian, Dr. Alan Cottrell. They have one grown son, Andy, who lives in Boston, Massachusetts.

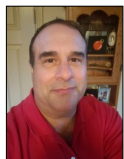

Happy Pi Day! I have the pleasure of writing this column on March 14th, or for the geeks out there, 3.14 (π). So why all the excitement? Besides being an excuse to have a great slice of your favorite pie, 3.14 is the value of π and is never ending, and so are the offering gifts to Triumphant! As of this writing, we are two months into 2022, 1/6th of the year is already done, and giving is pretty much on target — just slightly behind. For February, we rebounded from our slow start at the beginning of the year. Once again, our Preschool and MDO program had a monthly net gain of \$2,781.42. And as the Financial Summary chart shows on page 14, our monthly offering goal was achieved and the building fund had a slight shortfall for the month. So overall, a pretty good month for a February.

A Fun Fact about Giving:



Did you know that most banks offer a Bill Pay service which is equivalent to writing and mailing a paper check? Most Bill Pay services are free of charge (check with your bank for exact details). Bill Pay services can be either automatic monthly payments or manual payments to be equivalent to the General Operating Fund or Building Fund offerings. I use this service to do regular automatic donations for both general offering and building fund donations.

I'm also pleased to report that we have a new bookkeeper! Helen Bauer has graciously volunteered to perform the duties of Bookkeeper for the church. I am grateful for her service, and look forward to working with her and the rest of the finance team to manage TLC's finances. I greatly appreciate Jerry Guebard and Marilyn Winters for assisting with the Bookkeeper duties while we get Helen up to speed.

7 Important Women of the Protestant Reformation

This is the second of the seven notable women of the Protestant Reformation featured in *The Christian Post*. Although these women have differing backgrounds, they each greatly supported the movement and helped advance Protestant beliefs.

Argula von Grumbach (1492 - 1554)



Argula von Grumbach (1492-1554), a Bavarian noblewoman who was a prominent supporter of the Protestant Reformation.

Born to a Bavarian noble family named von Stauff the same year that Christopher Columbus first sailed to the Western hemisphere, Argula von Grumbach was known for her defense of the Reformation.

When the University of Ingolstadt arrested a Protestant teacher, von Grumbach wrote a letter of protest that promoted Reformation ideas and was widely distributed to the public.

Martin Luther, who corresponded with von Grumbach extensively and met her in person in 1530 near Augsburg, spoke highly of the Bavarian noblewoman and her work.

"That most noble woman, Argula von Stauffer, is there making a valiant fight with great spirit boldness of speech and knowledge of Christ. She deserves that all pray for Christ's victory in her," wrote Luther to a friend.

"She alone, among these monsters, carries on with firm faith, though, she admits, not without inner trembling. She is a singular instrument of Christ."

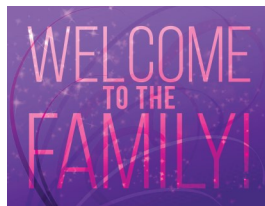

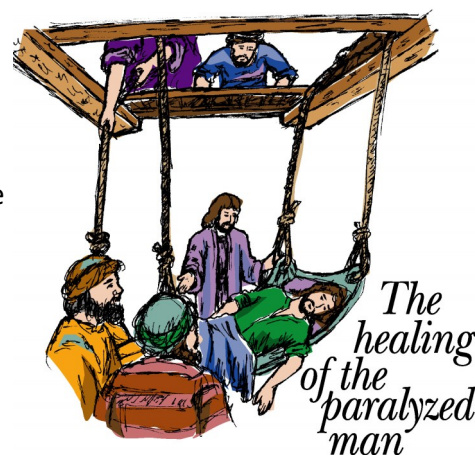


As I write this, we are going through Lent. Our congregation's focus, as we reflect, has been centered around "community." God never intended for any of us to live the Christian life alone. So, community is one of God's great gifts in that He pours out His love on us all. It is a picture of what God desires the world to be – a rich life where we meet needs and receive joy together. We share a common life in Christ, moving beyond self-interest and superficial relationships. As believers, we commit ourselves to the biblical ideal of a life together as the people of God. This is a growth process where we forgive, teach, encourage, pray for, serve, and love one another. We are to be kind, compassionate, generous, and hospitable, regarding each other more highly than ourselves – all out of our reverence for Christ.

All of this reflects the motivation of Stephen Ministry – to bear each other's burdens (Galatians 6:2) and to come alongside the hurting, especially as others are walking away — not to criticize, scold, or judge but to support, encourage, assist, love, uplift, and pray with and for people as they handle difficult life situations and challenges. We truly listen as others share their struggles, failures, heartaches, and even successes. These qualities are often rare in our society.

Stephen Ministers put aside their self-interests so they can serve others. They fully and freely share the spiritual gifts God has given them. The presence and power of God is brought into the caring relationship. If we think we can live in total independence and self-sufficiency, we're deluding ourselves. **Not only were we created for community, we also need community.** The truth is that we need to trust and depend on other believers to walk alongside us and spur us on in our faith. We rejoice and mourn with each other (Romans 12:15).

In the New Testament (Mark 2:1-12, Matthew 9:1-9, Luke 5:17-28), we find the story of the paralytic's healing. In Capernaum, where Jesus was teaching, some men sought healing for their friend. The man was severely paralyzed and lying on a mat, incapable of self-supporting work and dependent on the grace of others for survival. But too many people had come to the house where Jesus was teaching. After carrying their friend this far, these men were determined not to be deterred. They carried him up to the roof and made a hole in it to lower their friend, via ropes, to the feet of Jesus. Jesus recognized the faith of these men and the extraordinary efforts to bring their friend to Him. He recognized that they allowed no obstacle to stop their purpose. Jesus spoke with compassion and tenderness, understanding the man's deep and unspoken needs – even more than his paralysis. Jesus announced the forgiveness of the man's sins.



Like the paralyzed man, when suffering (for example: death, illness, unemployment) comes, and we are paralyzed on a stretcher needing help to meet and move through the pain to God, we can feel no one cares or will carry our stretcher. This man's friends give us a beautiful illustration of community in their persevering actions on his behalf. In community, they were intentional in their purpose on behalf of another.

Community invests in people, knitting hearts together. Community means watching over one another, knowing that as we serve, all of us are growing stronger in Christ.

I challenge you that the next time someone is facing a problem, and you're tempted to think it is no concern of yours – remember **when one is affected, all are at risk**. When you are lying paralyzed on your stretcher, which has four corners, who in your life will carry each one? Can someone else count on you?

The Good Steward

There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven: — Ecclesiastes 3:1 NIV

I had a sliver in my thumb — not exactly earth shaking, I know, nor a surprise, given that I had been trimming roses! It was time to get them ready for their spring and summer seasons. This got me to thinking, especially since I didn't seem to be able to get rid of the sliver.

In the verses that follow this “time for everything” quotation, there is a list of things there is a time for, but none of them are about getting rose thorn slivers! But there is one verse about planting and uprooting. While I was doing neither of the above, I was elbow-deep in trimming and getting my plants pruned and ready for the next year. Every year, we heed nature's call to tend our gardens and prepare them for new growth. I would also venture to guess that there are a few slivers involved in that tending. Believe me when I say I feel your pain!

I am the true vine and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit, he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful. — John 15:1 – 2 NIV

I always feel a little guilty about cutting living plants because at some level, I figure they must feel some pain. When I looked at all the cuttings in the trash can, and then back to the bushes, I wondered if I had cut too much. Was I causing more harm than good for my roses?

Fast forward about four weeks — it turns out I hadn't cut too much! My roses are starting to grow and they seem to have weathered the cutting and freezing temperatures just fine. I am looking forward to a really beautiful crop of roses in my back yard. I know — it has been four weeks — but I just got the last of that tenacious sliver out of my thumb. What does this say about the trimming and pruning I need to do to produce fruit? It takes time, effort, constant awareness of what is going on in my life, and I'm sure you can add a few more descriptors to the list.

This is to my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples. — John 15:8 NIV

The Good Steward is just like my rose bushes. We all need tending and pruning to produce good fruit. All this trimming, cutting, and pruning is not without a certain amount of pain. But like the actions involved in tending our lives, the pain passes and we become bearers of fruit — to the glory of our Father in heaven.

Join me as I continue to remove slivers and survive the pruning that is happening along the way.

February 2022 Financials

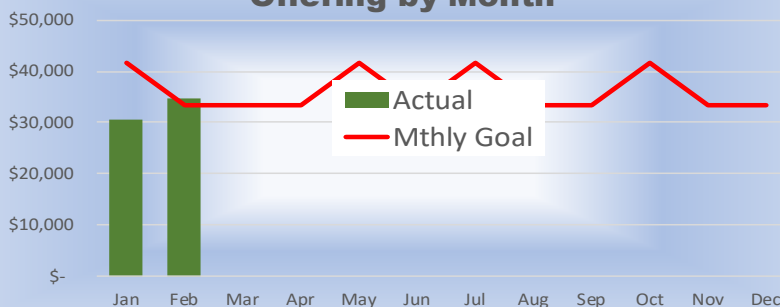
KEY POINTS:

✚ **February:** TLC rebounded slightly in February 2022 compared to the slow start in January. Weekly offering was slightly higher than budgeted, and the Preschool/MDO programs had an overall net of \$2,781.42. However, even though expenses were slightly lower than budgeted, TLC had an overall net loss of \$765.15.

✚ **Building Fund and Mortgage:** The building fund was also slightly under budget for the month. An additional \$471.87 will be taken from the Building Fund Current Excess account to make a full mortgage payment.

✚ **Mortgage:** The Finance team has submitted refinancing packages to both Thrivent and the Mission Investment Fund to get firm quotes from each vendor on the going interest rates and one-time refinancing fees. We should have information on the refinancing options in the next Trumpet.

Offering Year to Date



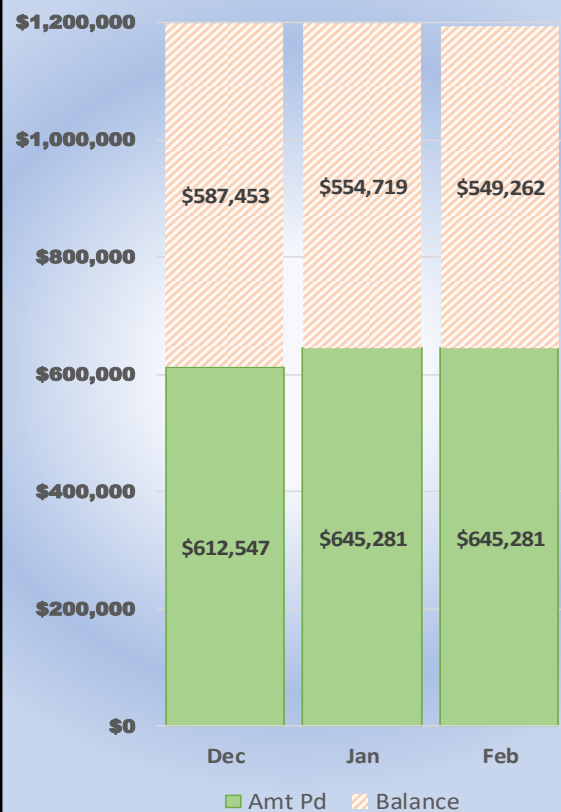
Bldg Fund Donations By Month
